
# **Paisley Abbey**

At some point in all our lives we find ourselves asking deep questions about our identity, our purpose and our mortality. The need for answers or, at least, pointers become urgent as we try to make sense of our lives, our relationships and our work.

#### WHAT WE BELIEVE

Christians believe that every human being is made in the image of God and is loved deeply by God. We believe that each individual is of immeasurable worth despite our shortcomings and failings, our flaws and our inadequacies. We also believe that we have been made to know God in a way that is amazingly fulfilling, liberating and challenging.

Throughout the ages, God has invited us to this life of trust and faith by showing what kind of God he is through the beauty of creation, through the way of life (the Law) he gave to the Jews and through the prophets: most particularly, and fully, through the man Jesus of Nazareth whose whole life and death shows us who God is and what God is like.

The beginning of faith is to trust in this loving God who knows us more profoundly than we know ourselves.

And from that initial step a journey that will last a life begins. As we travel, we believe the Holy Spirit will guide and strengthen us, leading us to discover more and more of God's love and, also, to a place of beauty, wholeness and peace.

A place of 'beauty, wholeness and peace' within our life. That must be the dream of every human being – even though they may never consider using such words.

For a great many people, such a dream ought to be the consequence of political activity and government action. Sadly, for many people, that is not reality. Day after day, countless numbers of our fellow citizens, whether elderly or young, endure situations at work or within their home, more akin to 'nightmare' than 'dream'; and a far cry from any 'beauty, wholeness or peace'.

## THE NEED TO SPEAK UP AND OUT AS SOCIETY'S CONSCIENCE

The Holy Ministry of the Christian Churches embrace all political affiliations and allegiances. And so, while I may hold strong, personal, political opinions, I deliberately refrain from promoting any 'party' line in my preaching or writing. That being said, given all I have written about our belief in the immeasurable worth of each individual and how each individual is part of God's creation, I profoundly believe the Church has a primary and fundamental responsibility to speak up and out for those unable to do so for themselves. Society simply doesn't recognise an alternative voice of conscience.

By the time you read these words, the season of Lent will have already begun. These weeks eventually leading up to Easter, are a means of preparation for the events of that first Holy Week, the drama of which plays out the whole of human life. Do try to come to the special services being held in the Abbey. The things of Christian faith are no less demanding and rewarding than anything else about which we might choose to learn.

#### **HOLY WEEK SERVICES**

Monday, 3<sup>rd</sup> April to Good Friday, 7<sup>th</sup> April.

For Christians, Holy Week is never a comfortable time. It is not an easy week in which to worship and say that we believe in God.

During Holy Week we accompany Jesus on his way to the Cross. As we reflect on the torture, suffering and humiliation he had to endure, we find that we also have to confront the experience of powerlessness and pain that are still the daily reality of life for so many people across the globe.

This year, the Minister will speak about some of the characters and events central to the whole drama and will try to show their relevance for our own life's experience.

Services begin at 7.30pm Monday to Maundy Thursday and will be accompanied by Abbey choristers.

Holy Communion will be celebrated at the Maundy Thursday service.

On **Good Friday** – the Three Hours Devotion will be held between 12noon and 3.00pm.

Between 12noon and 1.00pm - Durufle's Requiem will be sung by the Abbey Choir.

Between 1.00pm and 3.00pm – Meditations and prayers; and the Abbey String Group play Haydn's 'The Seven Last Words'

There will be no service on the evening of Good Friday. This helps to heighten the terrible event of the crucifixion itself.

## **EASTER SUNDAY**

11 am Sacrament of Holy Communion The Abbey Choir sing Mozart's 'Coronation Mass' accompanied by a small orchestra.

#### LENT APPEAL 2023

Dear Abbey Members,

When you see the heading 'Lent Appeal' I hope you don't say, "Oh, not another appeal for money from the Kirk Session." However, I would like you think the Appeal is giving you the opportunity to keep the Abbey afloat in exceedingly turbulent financial waters.

Last year (2022), considering that we were still coming out of 'Lock Down', we had a highly successful Lent Appeal that raised almost £9,000 00. With the addition of Gift Aid from HMRC, the total certainly exceeded £11,000.

Thank you all for that outstanding effort.

Now we are fortunate that most of the Covid restrictions have been removed although the amount being donated by the congregation and visitors has not reached the pre-Covid total. It might be some time before that total is reached. However, while giving has been reduced, costs have continued to increase. For instance, the cost of electricity has increased four-fold and when our fixed price gas contract expires at the end of September, there will certainly be a crippling price increase.

So, to the Lent Appeal which I hope you will consider donating to.

This will run until Easter Day, 9 April.

Every little bit of money, no matter how small, will be really appreciated and put to good use in supporting Paisley Abbey, a community and building that is close to all of our hearts.
